## International conference explores religion

NOVI SAD -- Even though most Serbian citizens call themselves religious, they rarely go to church, pray and read the Bible.

Speaking at an international conference held as part of the Divided God project, Sociologist Zorica Kuburić said that "eighteen percent of those who declared themselves as atheists or agnostics, actually behaved as religious persons, conforming to the socially acceptable types of behavior."

Philosopher Tomislav Žigmanov said on the same occasion that "the abuse of the church and religion for political ends was still frequent in the region."

The conference has gathered fifty young people from Bosnia, Slovenia, Turkey, Germany and Serbia, experts in the fields of humanitarian and intercultural studies.

The aim of the Divided God project is to establish an intercultural dialogue on the role of religion and religious communities in generating and solving problems and conflicts in the post-communist era.

Novi Sad movie director Želimir Žilnik, one of the project's coordinator, explained that the main idea was to address issues of religious and cultural difference in Europe at present through discussion and debate, raising the awareness of interethnic and inter-religious social contexts and issues.

### **Translated comments B92:**

- 1. Religiousness in Serbia? Seventy percent of Serbs have not even been baptized before the war. (Darko, 21 July 2007 10:58)
- 2. In the West of Europe, the role of the religion is not as great as in the East or South. In my opinion, strong religious feelings cannot contribute to friendship, reconciliation and understanding in the future. Until the religious leaders, in the Balkans as well as the Middle East, change their 'rhetoric', there won't be peace that would last. I support young people who won't let themselves be manipulated. - 3. "Eighteen percent of those who declared themselves as atheists or agnostics actually behaved as religious persons, conforming to the socially acceptable types of behavior." This is a wonderful example of mental molesting of those who do not share their opinion and who, thus, feel forced to conform to this type of social behaviour. Although I cannot fully understand how someone who sticks to their own beliefs and opinions can cross themselves when amongst believers while at home, they wash their hands of that. Perhaps many people would dare to acknowledge and demonstrate their attitudes and opinions more clearly if we would stop disqualifying the nonbelievers or throwing stones on the members of other religions etc., perhaps one day, when this country has become a democratic country.

- 4. It is one thing to be a truly religious, and a completely different thing is to praise God because your neighbour does the same, who, again, does it because of the others...because it is the custom-'it should be done' as the wise Serbs would say. (Duša, 21 July 2007 11:38)
- 5. Today, it is a greater sin to go to church and pray, in front of the immoral priests and members of the clergy. Sin is not easily forgiven. It is much more useful to stay at home, than to stand together with the immoral. (Rade, 21 July 2007 11:48)
- 6. Everyone experiences their own religion in a different way. One does not have to go to church and kiss the hand of a priest in order for oneself to feel as a believer. It is a much greater virtue to respect ones neighbours, not to steal, not to kill, to help the poor as much as one can, than to be a donor for a church. I am an Orthodox Christian and I belong to the group of moderate believers if I can call us so, because I am against many pagan customs in the Orthodox religion which I think have to be exterminated ( for example, taking the food to the cemeteries etc.). You should respect your faith and tradition but do not look down on other religions and traditions, and there's the recipe for a good life on the planet. Even those who belong to various pseudo Christian churches or sects should not be denied the right to do the same. Let us remember the fact that Christianity was considered a sect in the ancient times of the Roman Empire, and has become the most widespread religion. (Djuradj, 21 July 2007 11:58)
- 7. You have replaced the communist ideology with Orthodox religion and the highest commander with God. The religion has become your new ideology and it is being used by the state as means of retaining and nourishing hatred towards everything that comes from the West, just like in the times of communism. The problem in Serbia is the reversed system of moral values. So, until the moment this problem has been solved, every predominating ideology will be in purpose of resisting everything that is moral or civilized. - 8. It seems that the aim of the project is to show the way how religion is being used for the political goals in this region. Thus, the goal of the project is political by nature. (kometator, 21 July 2007 12:23)
- 9. If the Slovenian co organizers of this project respect religion (their own or some other), and they have named this project 'Divided God', why don't we/you start writing the word God with the initial capital-which is so according to our languages well as other European languages (Dieu-French, Gott-German, Dio-Italian, Dios-Spanish, etc.)? - 10. The thing is that religious practice here is identified with formal behaviour connected to certain customs and holidays. Few people are trying to understand the message of Christianity. In my opinion, Serbian Orthodox Church does not contribute enough to change that, although its essential mission is to spread and pass on the content of the Gospels.

- 11. It is unbelievable how Serbs are illiterate and uneducated people, especially when it comes to religion. They do not even try to learn anything. They are probably waiting for the president or the government to provide them with some kind of education that does not include learning as they are used to waiting for everything else.

- 12. For centuries here, religion has had the role to provide akin of psychological recuperation for the impure conscience of the people. You have sinned, then you go to liturgy (in Orthodox Church it is a ceremony that corresponds to Catholic mass) which provokes a change of your feelings, but not the change of your motives or character. You leave no longer carrying the burden of the sin, but carrying the same principals as before. When the feeling of guilt reappears because of the stupid things you do, you go to liturgy again. Even without the ceremony you feel privileged when it comes to sin, because you belong to the heavenly people, so God will forgive you before he forgives somebody else. Therefore research reveals that religious people are generally much worse than atheists. The research by the Institute of Psychology of The Faculty of Philosophy in Belgrade reveals that 'the lowest scores of readiness to reconciliate are achieved by those who declare themselves as 'convinced believers who accept all the teachings of the religion they belong to and behave according to them", The next are the believers who do not accept literally all the demands of the religion. They also score lower than the indecisive, uninterested and not religious others. " (ref. Dr Nebojša Petrović, Psihološke osnove pomirenja(Psychological Basis of Reconciliation), 265, 2005). - 13. My neighbour, who before these wars had never thought of going to church, to pray or read the Bible, asked me the other day: 'Do you know how one should behave in church, I'm going for the first time?' I should note that she is approaching fifty years of age. (Djole, 21 July 2007 14:03)
- 14. Much more worrying than not going to church or praying to God is the fact that people do not respect any of the Ten Commandments. Every day, we see people who put the material values before everything else. It would not be so scary if they did not acquire the material things in a severe and inhuman way. Greed and covetousness have become common sight in our everyday lives. Lobbyists and monopolists are being created in order to keep a huge capital which they do not actually need, because even with a small part of the capital they would have enough for a good and happy life. I often have a feeling that the man in Serbia has become a beast who considers nothing precious or sacred except for money. I do not know what to think about people who wear crosses around their necks as symbols of their religion, while in their past they have committed cold-blooded murders - and it was only and exclusively for money. All in all. I think that Serbs are generally dishonest believers and that in their believing there is much hypocrisy, in addition to what I have mentioned above. Here, unfortunately, faith and religion is still identified with patriotism, but mostly with the false patriotism, where chauvinism is expressed much more than nationalism. Unfortunately, the church does not criticize such situation enough, because even amongst the clergy there are a lot who would send biblical messages to people rather than apply them themselves. crossed themselves demonstrating their belonging to something which is, regretfully, equally horrible as the salvation in the form of a political party. If it were not true, social differences between the members of the clergy and the citizens with the same level of education wouldn't have become so big, priests wouldn't give blessings to wars, killings, concentration camps; Filaret, Pahomije and alike would stand trail for sins and crimes they committed to their own people, and there would be somebody who would explain that God is one and that he can be the moral law within ourselves which, unfortunately, Serbs have completely lost, that God is everywhere, not only within the unnecessary and expensively furnished temples, but also in the junkyards, hospitals... It can be an indicator how religious communities lake power: the army, police, Berettas, law-breakers (criminals, Milosevic, Legija), and on the other hand, coolly watch or throw away those who beg in front of the temples and all the miserables of Kosovo (which is the most important in the whole world until we think of something else – the same importance we gave to 'Dalmatian Kosovo', Slavonia, Republika Srpska...). For a start, it would be good, after conducting surveys to determine the public opinion, to start a dialogue end see who are the newcomers amongst the believers and why there are no people who used to visit the empty churches in the times when there was less money and a little more compassion and honesty.

- 17. Why should we go to church when every month there is a priest accused of sexually molesting a boy, and why should we read the Bible when there are so many and each is different; is there anyone who lies more of those writers?... (nex, 21 July 2007 14:31)
- 18. - 19. Philosophers of religion have defined religion as EVERYTHING according to which the man defines and understands the world around him. If they do not believe in God, they believe in something else. Agnosticism DOES NOT EXIST. - 26. The difference between a believer and an atheist is that believers don't know what they believe in and atheists don't know what they are talking about. A mutual characteristic is that neither goes to church.

- 31. Basically, there is nothing new to be said, because people have been questioning the existence of God for centuries. So, nowadays, only a replica is being created in the current context, a social-political context in the first place, which I consider a mistake.
